ECC KaGabay Program fulfills PWRDs desire to be productive again

Arthur Diwan, a 49 year-old resident of Asin Road, Baguio City, worked as a locomotive operator for 28 years in Lepanto Consolidated Mining

Company. On 4 May 2014, his right leg was severely injured when he was accidentally hit by a passing locomotive and was not able to pull it out immediately. It eventually led to his above the knee amputation.

He filed for Employees' Compensation (EC) claim and was granted an amount of P52,000.00. On 3 November 2014, he expressed his desire to avail of the physical therapy and prosthesis under the Employees' Compensation Commission's (ECC) Katulong at Gabay ng Manggagawang may Kapansanan (KaGabay) Program. He said that this would be very beneficial for his mobility and be productive again.

He also conveyed his desire to avail of the free livelihood training. He said that once his leg prosthesis is already available, he would like to pursue organic mushroom production because he

sees this as a potential source of income.

On 20 February 2015, Diwan's above knee modular prosthesis worth P130,000 from the ECC was fitted to him.

Not wasting any precious time, Diwan underwent training for Oyster Mushroom Production on 23-24 March 2015 at Benguet State University, together with other PWRDs.

Now, Diwan has already set up a conducive area in his home where his mushroom fruiting bags are placed.

"Given the right kind of support and assistance, persons with work-related disabilities can become economically independent and productive again. That is the ultimate goal of the KaGabay Program," ECC Executive Director Stella Zipagan-Banawis. ■

PWRDs in Region 1 extend heartfelt gratitude to ECC

Another PWRD is Keen

Harley Viernes, 28, who worked as a credit investigator for a company that sells furniture and home appliances. During one of his official errands, Viernes figured in a motorcycle accident that fractured his right leg.

The third one is Arturo Amezola, 58, a utility person in a home depot whose right foot was crushed by a box full of ceramic tiles.

PWRD, re-employed by former company, thanks to ECC's KaGabay Program

William Layuan is a former maintenance worker of Dole Philippines who accidentally injured his fingers while working. As his injury was proven work-related, he was granted permanent partial disability benefit under the Employee Compensation (EC) Program.

Layuan became a beneficiary of the Employees' Compensation Commission's (ECC) Katulong at Gabay ng Manggagawang May Kapansanan (KaGabay). With the assistance of the staff of ECC Regional Extension Unit No. 12, he took an Automotive Servicing NC II course in Schola de San Jose in Polomolok, South Cotabato.

Finishing the said course upgraded his skill. After his graduation on 23 March 2015, Dole Philippines hired him again but not as a maintenance worker. He

is now a skilled employee of the company working as a machine operator for juicing machines due to his enhanced skill provided by the ECC-KaGabay Program.


"The KaGabay Program aims to empower persons with work-related disabilities, (PWRDs) to be economically independent amidst their disabilities, by providing them with rehabilitation services, and then giving them skills or livelihood trainings," ECC Executive Director Stella Zipagan-Banawis explained.

Another KaGabay beneficiary in South Cotabato was able to finish her course with flying colors. Marevic Monding, a former field worker of AMCOOP in Surallah, South Cotabato, took a Computer Servicing NC II course at the South East Asian Institute of Technology (SEAIT) in Tupi,

South Cotabato. She was a victim of a vehicular accident inside the company site and had serious injuries on her back, causing her to stop working for a few months. After availing of the ECC's free physical therapy at the Doctors Clinic and Hospital, Inc. in Koronadal City, she immediately grabbed the opportunity offered by the ECC KaGabay Program to gain more knowledge and skills in computer troubleshooting. She graduated last 30 March 2015 with the distinction of being the Outstanding Trainee of SEAIT.

She is now preparing to take part in the upcoming Labor Day Job Fair On 1 May 2015 as she would like to work again.

"It is our dream for the PWRDs to succeed. Their condition should not become a hindrance to achieve their goals and aspirations," Banawis said. ■

Palabay, Viernes and Amezola, all residents of La Union, were displaced from their employment.

The ECC, on its own initiative and with referrals from the Department of Labor and Employment Region I, managed to track down the said PWRDs and provide basic orientation on the Employees' Compensation Program as well as in the filing of EC claims.

Palabay, Viernes and Amezola soon received their monthly pension of EC disability benefits from the Social Security System.

The ECC extended further aid by enrolling the three PWRDs in its KaGabay Program. ■
